- Format of articles: Because there are many levels of technologic sophistication among club members, the editor will accept a full spectrum of submissions:
- —simply a text or email with photos and a description of the club project without any formatting, and the editor will format it for you.
- -Please list names of club members in the photos, L. to R.
- -Word or Adobe PDF document is acceptable.
- If there are photos of <u>youth</u> and your club does not have written parental consent to publish the youth's photo, the youths' faces will be obscured.
- Length of article:
- -Max of 3 pages if submitted in Word or PDF format
- -Max of 10 photos if photos and text/article are submitted without formatting
- If you have creative club members who like to write or take photos, please encourage them to submit articles, poems or photos that would be of interest to TFGC. The member and their club will be recognized in a "Special Feature". At the end of each year, outstanding articles, photography and poetry will be nominated by the VG editor for a #68 B, C or D TFGC State Award.

Message from the TFGC President Lelia Johnson



Hello and Hallelujah, TFGC!

The autumn equinox was September 22. Summer is gone and hopefully taken with it our hot dry weather and sporadic floods! Gardening is equally unpredictable. My feathered neighbors laced my beds with sunflowers. They are cheerful and sometimes large surprises.

I cannot help but begin by sharing the news that TFGC acquire 68 new members from April to August. The 2025 ETF Grants have been awarded. The Environmental, Garden and Landscape Schools are gearing up. Read this VG to see the myriad projects our Districts and Clubs are accomplishing. Flower Shows and Judges Councils and Junior Garden Clubs Oh, my!

And now I hope to put some wondering minds at ease. First, may I explain the TFGC Racheff House and Gardens status. The first hour of my administration I was asked, "What will happen to Racheff?" At that moment I stated that my plan was to ask the 2025 Executive Board members to serve as interim officers. They agreed along with other members of District II and District IV. That is precisely what has happened. Accounts have all been retitled to TFGC but remain separate from the other state accounts. The interim officers have welcomed former Racheff team members and their vast experience. An interior inventory of the house condition was made. Immediately some serious repairs began (for example, water pouring into the main meeting room from a terrace leak above). KUB Internet has been installed. Several needed garden projects are underway. While shouldering their elected and appointed positions your TFGC officers are also focusing on the needs of our headquarters. The Racheff meetings are on the second Monday of each month, with some exceptions. While Zoom is in place, absentee committee members should read the monthly emailed minutes and treasurer's reports. Then there should be few questions about operating costs.

Perhaps you recall my August request for clubs to add Racheff as a charitable donation to their budgets. My motivation is the sizeable cost of running these shareable gardens. Keep in mind that the property is on 3.5 acres and the three-story house was built in 1902. My \$3,000 monthly budget number was challenged. It was low. July Racheff expenses were \$4,471.87. \$811 were

house related, including the yearly fees of \$226 for the post office box and \$57 for the safe deposit box. All the other July expenses were garden related. Again, if you have questions, I recommend reading the monthly treasurer's reports sent to the Racheff Committee members. Ask your District Directors to share them if you are interested.

Another area of member concern is my Ways & Means project. Every TFGC president has one. The profits from her project are disbursed at her discretion. As I prepared to be your president, I opened my drawers containing former TFGC Ways & Means items. I purchase these to support former presidents. My drawer has 10 packs of note cards, 4 scarves, 3 TFGC shirts with our logo, and more. I wanted a project in which everyone could participate but not leave overstocked or personally unusable items and make a profit. My project allows all of your voluntary 2025 and 2026 Ways and Means donations to go directly to our Treasury, not in a drawer.

How will I direct the disbursement of Ways and Means funds collected during my administration? They will all support the expenses of TFGC and Ivan Racheff House and Gardens. This is my project, approved at my first Board Meeting in April. In order to take care of our expenses we need revenue. If you have never supported Ways & Means in the past this is a bargain. Choose any amount or none. YOUR CHOICE!!

October is a busy month. The Districts are having their fall meetings and I plan to visit each one of them. Your wonderful club and district news items bring me joy and a sense of justification for the labor involved in our serious business concerns.

October 28, 2025 is our Fall Board of Directors Meeting. You will receive your call letter in a few days. Again we will meet in Murfreesboro at Through the Grapevine at 10:30am CST. All Board members will receive an email invitation. With a limit of 99 attendees, other TFGC members will be sent the meeting credentials upon request to Diane Ryder. You must have a direct Zoom invitation to attend.

My gratitude is boundless for all who labor for TFGC.

As we travel this journey let us remember that we are a TEAM. I pray that we can continue in an atmosphere of congeniality and mutual support.

Message from the TFGC President-elect LaQuita Misner

Dear Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs,

In 1972, the Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs was bequeathed a property and home/office in the Lonsdale community of Knoxville. The property was quite unique along with its history. An Austrian immigrant, Ivan Racheff had come to this country with nothing, worked to get educated, well-educated in fact, and made something of himself. When asked to inspect an iron works mill in Knoxville, he came down from Chicago and must have had a vision. For he returned a short time later determined to purchase the floundering mill and adjoining property. He built an office with living quarters for himself and set about restoring the mill to prosperity.

And he did.

An iron works is a dirty business with much detritus left behind. This leftover debris covered his new property and the processes used in the business did not make for a healthy breathing environment either. Way ahead of his time, Mr. Racheff made a plan to clean the air in his corner of the city, protecting his neighbors at the same time. But how? What could be his solution? What could he do as one person to change the environment? He could plant trees and shrubs and flowers from all over the world and create a beautiful garden oasis out of this property.

And he did.

Seventy-six dollars. Seventy-six dollars is the amount Mr. Racheff used to start his garden. And before he was finished, he had covered his three and-a-half acres with all manner of horticulture. He had a pond, structures and areas in the gardens and enough different trees to be designated a level one arboretum. Bringing bulbs from his native Europe, he covered areas in color as well. And this brought what was once a blighted eyesore into a sanctuary of beauty and respite. To facilitate meetings and business hospitality, he added a meeting hall to his home. And through it all, his vision was to share his bounty with the neighborhood around him, especially the children.

And he did.







Time has a way of passing and as it did, Mr. Racheff began to think about how to preserve his haven for posterity. Who could be entrusted with the responsibility? He had been honored with a Silver Star award from the National Garden Clubs for the novel transformation of his property. And so, when the University of Tennessee was unable to take on the responsibility for continuing his vision, the Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs was approached to carry it forward.

And we accepted.

The federation accepted. At almost fifty years in existence, they now owned property. Mr. Racheff's home, office and gardens became the state headquarters of the Tennessee federation. What a gift. What a responsibility. As time passes, like it or not, it also provides an education. With the acceptance of the gift of the property from Mr. Racheff, the federation would have been wise to set plans in place, or rather funds in place to take care of the magnificent gift we had been given. But, alas, that was not the case. While it was

a proud accomplishment to be able to tout the ownership of a physical state headquarters, lip service may have been most of what the new state headquarters received. Tennessee, as states go, is a long way across and it was and is a commitment to make a trip to Racheff. But commitment is what a building and gardens require. Attention is what they have to have to be healthy. When we accepted the gift of the property, we should have expected to have to take care of it. All of it.

We did not.

And so, my story comes to the conclusion that the primary responsibility for Racheff House and Gardens, the Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs headquarters, the gift Ivan Racheff so carefully bequeathed to us to care for has fallen on District Iv to maintain. That responsibility includes the maintenance, the expenses, the work hours and almost all of the fundraising to take care of our historic property. One district out of four has tried to provide everything the property needed for the last fifty plus years.

We have tried.

Now, it is time for the entire federation to take on more than the honor of having a state headquarters before it is too late. It is time for it to act to support the headquarters with physical and financial support that should have been in place since the acceptance of the gift.

It is time to take responsibility as stewards of the house and gardens in the manner Mr. Racheff believed we would.

For the gift, for the children, for the future, it is time.

from The Interim Racheff Committee

September 30, 2025

Since April 2025, the TFGC Executive Board and volunteers have been hard at work at your state headquarters. The directive to address and take care of the house and gardens has been taken very seriously and with much enthusiasm. Here are just a few things that have been accomplished in the five short months we have been on the job.

- ✓ All locks with previous access have been changed and keys distributed to the officers working on the committee or staff. Anyone needing access to the house and not in possession of a key should contact the TFGC President Lelia Johnson to gain access to the house. Locks not found in good working condition have been replaced.
- ✓ All financial accounts now have TFGC signatories along with Racheff officers per the TFGC bylaws. All financial account reports are distributed, reviewed and discussed in detail at each meeting.
- ✓ Investment firms are visiting the meetings to present information and discuss our strategy for supporting the house and gardens in a more proactive manner.
- The house sub-committee has inspected and evaluated the house for needs and repairs and reported to the entire committee for prioritization.
- ✓ The Knox County/Knoxville Planning Commission has visited and spoken to the committee about the
 historic guidelines that we need to follow when repairing the house and expressed interest in being a
 part of our mission to restore the house and gardens to their best.
- Monies have been located that are available for use to repair the balcony leak, the project re-evaluated and work begun to mitigate the leak and repair the damage from it. The company entrusted with this work has been respectful of our non-profit status and is eager to assist in restoration along with us.
- Members of the board have been in discussion with our supporters at the CMC mill and employees have assisted in helping with the Children's Garden restoration project. We hope to include the representative working with us on the committee.
- ✓ KUB has been enlisted to inspect the valves in the garden for leaks. We are currently awaiting the final report so that we might take action to resolve the problem.
- ✓ Internet, Wi-Fi and phone services have been updated and meetings are now being held on Zoom to enhance the opportunity for TFGC member involvement across the state.
- ✓ Visitation is up and member clubs as well as outside groups have used and supported the house and gardens
 with their funds. Events have been held and are planned by the committee to continue this positive trend.

Much credit goes to the new TFGC president and her board, TFGC advisors and volunteers dedicated to the house and gardens for the heroic efforts being put in to this restoration and revitalization of not only the house and gardens and the committee to care for them, but the mission of Mr. Racheff.

TFGC Endowment Trust Fund Grant Recipients for 2025

Congratulations to the eight clubs receiving matching grants from the TFGC Endowment Trust Fund. Matching grants are awarded up to a maximum of \$1,000.00 per club or organization with grant awards presented at district fall membership meetings. The clubs receiving matching grants for 2025 are Blossomway Garden Club, Memphis Garden Club and Scenic Hills Garden Club in District I, Flower Growers Garden Club in District II and Chapman Highway Garden Club, Kanunsita Garden Club, Mountain Laurel Garden Club and Sevierville Garden Club in District IV. The total grant money awarded to the eight clubs is \$6,965.00 with grants ranging from \$1,000.00 to \$250.00 per club.

Following are brief descriptions of the projects the clubs will soon be starting or continuing. Blossomway Garden Club will be continuing a project they started in the fall of 2024 improving a piece of property next door to AMVET Post 45 on Highway 79 N. The club plans on adding more plants, installing another arbor for vertical interest, adding another whimsical raised bed and picnic table to provide more seating and work surfaces for meetings, special events and working on projects.

Memphis Garden Club has partnered with the Church Health Center (CH) to revitalize its native perennial gardens. Through their collaborative relationship, the garden space is being transformed into a vibrant community gathering and educational area. A multipurpose pavilion has been constructed on the garden site where gardening classes are held using staff volunteers and employes of CH. The grant money will be applied toward the purchase of limestone benches providing seating for the classes and support the space's function as a community gathering area.

Scenic Hills Garden Club will use their grant money to redo a garden bed outside the sunroom of Alzheimer's Day Services in Kennedy Park. The beds will be cleaned out, landscape timbers replaced and soil amended with new plants such as Encore Azaleas, Drift Roses and possibly Hydrangeas incorporated into the new garden.

The Flower Growers Garden Club (FGGC) will be using their grant money to continue a project called "The Free Indigenous Seed Heirloom Planting Project. With Rutherford County having been the fastest growing county in Tennessee for eight years in a row, the club believes their project is their way of "Planting America" starting in Murfreesboro. The club plans to double an area planted last year at Middle Tennessee Christian School adjacent to bee boxes which is an education program offered. Last year's grant money was used to plant 1/3 acre with the help of students in the school's Bee Education Classes program. The club feels it is a great opportunity to teach the students about indigenous plants, flowers and their environmental impact. The Murfreesboro Airport would like the club to plant a stretch of runway with a mixture of pollinating and indigenous seeds as well as the Domestic Violence Center who is anxious for the club to plant



indigenous seeds at their headquarters and in the playground areas at the family shelters which will provide the club the opportunity to teach the children at the center the importance of the seeds to our environment and the creation of beauty. The club will continue placing free seed packets in public places in their community which has been very successful.

Chapman Highway Garden Club (CHGC) will be using their grant money to redo a front flower bed at Woodlawn Christian Church, a meeting place not only for the club but a meeting place for the City of Knoxville Neighborhood Association, youth groups and community police feedback sessions to mention a few. The club will add pollinator plants, perennial plants and annual plants to increase the beauty of the facility once a soil test is conducted, amend the soil according to test results with mulch added after plant installation with a soaker hose and timer installed to maintain proper soil moisture. The club will provide maintenance and replanting as needed.

The Kanunsita Garden Club will refresh a section of the front gardens and landscape of McMinn County Living Heritage Museum to enhance the building design, permit unencumbered exit in compliance with fire codes, require less maintenance and give preference to native plants.

Mountain Laurel Garden Club will use their grant money to improve the existing Wildlife Pond Garden at Fairview Elementary School for better accessibility for students and teachers of all abilities. Emphasis will be on reducing maintenance, display good sustainable garden practices for attracting and supporting local wildlife, provide a place for teaching moments such as observing nesting birds and insect life and enjoying the blooms of native flowers. The over riding purpose of the project is to make the pond area part of the school that the staff, students and parents will take pride in and use more.

Sevierville Garden Club (SGC) will use their grant money to purchase two commercial grade tables that will withstand the elements with attached seats to accommodate 8 to 12 children per table. SGC members for the last 18 years have provided lessons from March to November and during the summer months weekly to over 80 children each year. The children served are from kindergarten to 8th grade. The tables are needed for when students are creating plant signs, potting plants, tasting foods they are growing or have grown and for any written lessons. Lessons provided have been from the Junior Master Gardener curriculum titled, "Learn, Grow, Eat, Go.

Hopefully with these brief descriptions of projects underway, it has served as an inspiration for other clubs to apply for TFGC Endowment Trust Fund Matching Grants up to \$1,000.00. The trustees look forward to awarding more grants next year in 2026 helping our garden clubs to make a positive impact in their communities. We can all be participants in the Endowment Trust Fund Program as financial contributors. Donations to the fund can be made in memory or in honor of someone or as a gift from a club member or club. With your financial support, the ETF can continue to grow providing grants for club projects for years to come improving our communities and creating an awareness of the good work and value of garden clubs.

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION POLICIES—2025-2027

- These scholarships are available for college juniors, seniors, and graduate students. No doctoral
 candidates may apply. Sophomores may make an application for the junior year.
- 2. The applicant must be a resident of Tennessee and attend a Tennessee school.
- TFGC is proud of its scholarship program, which offers financial aid to students and promotes study in:
 - Agribusiness (Dairy Farming, Animal Science, Food Production, etc.)
 - · Agriculture Education
 - Agronomy
 - Biology, Botany
 - City (Rural and Urban) Planning
 - Economics

NOTE: Applicants must be **majoring** in one of the fields of study. The TFGC Scholarship Committee must grant approval for applications to be made in any major other than the ones listed.

- The applicant must be a full-time, currently enrolled student at the school through which the application is being made.
- Applications must be mailed to the TFGC Scholarship Chair as a complete package prior to December 1. No application received after that date will be considered.
- The TFGC Scholarship Chair will submit applicants or the number of scholarships to be awarded to the TFGC Board for approval at the Winter Board Meeting.
- The TFGC Scholarships will be in the amount of \$1,500 each, limited to a total of \$4,500 in any fiscal year, if funds are available.
- 8. All applicants must have at least a "B" average to apply (3.0 on a 4.0-point scale).
- A complete official academic transcript.

The following Scale of Points will be used for the evaluation of each application:

ACADEMIC RECORD: A complete official transcript of grades is required (40% of total). Emphasis is placed on the strength of courses related to the student's major in required field.

APPLICANT'S LETTER: Discussion of background, goals, personal commitment (25% of total) to chosen career and financial need. (Limited to one typed page, single spaced.)

A list of this information should be supplied on a separate sheet of paper. Each page (3 in total) should be titled "EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES, HONORS RECEIVED, AND WORK EXPERIENCE" (10% of total).

FINANCIAL NEED: Signatures of Financial Aid Officer and student are required on fully completed Financial Aid Form (25% of total).

RECOMMENDATIONS: Two letters of recommendation (example: department heads, professors, or employers).

Funds are available for a District III Brainerd Scholarship. The recipient is decided upon by District III for an applicant from HAMILTON COUNTY, TN. (Funds for this scholarship were donated by Brainerd Garden Club of District III.) Deep South Garden Clubs and National Garden Clubs also have scholarships. Their applications are on their respective websites (<u>Deep South</u> and <u>NGC</u>) and must be received by the TFGC Chair by the state deadline, **December 1**. Qualified applicants may apply for all.

NOTE: Should you have trouble with a website, please notify me. Applicants for TFGC, DSGC, and NGC must be Tennessee residents and attending schools in Tennessee.

Guidelines for College/University Financial Aid Office Administering the Scholarship

Now she resides in Nashville where she designs and sells custom barns for The Barn Store. We welcome her expertise and talent to build for the future for the Deep South Region.





 Poet's family does not have to be a member of the local sponsoring garden club.
- Poems should be no more than 24 lines (including title) with a max of 42 letters/spaces per line in order to fit on single page of the booklet.
- · Poems do not have to rhyme. They may be traditional verse, acrostics, blank verse, cinquains, diamond poems, limerick, or haiku
- When choosing a poem title, please be creative and incorporate the theme: "Plant America for the Next 100 Years." However, the theme should not be used as the title to any poetry. When judging, the title is worth 10 points.
- Poets should be strongly encouraged to proofread their work for grammatical and spelling errors.
 All entries become the property of National Garden Clubs, Inc.
- · Sending Region winning entries to NGC: All Region winning entries must be typed, titled, and sent to the National Chairperson (James Pavelka, jamespavelka@comcast.net) in Word format via email, and the original hard copy mailed for judging.
- · National winners will be announced at the NGC 2026 National Convention and the local garden club contact person will be contacted regarding any winning entry.

Submissions and Deadlines

All poems are submitted to a local garden club affiliated with National Garden Clubs, Inc. Local clubs send their winning poems (1 per grade-level in each category) to their State by the published State deadline. State winning poems are sent to their Region Contest by 2/1/2026. Region winners are sent to the National Contest by 3/1/2026. National winning poems are announced in May 2026, and published online in a free digital poetry booklet.

Eligibility, Categories and Judging Criteria

- Youth in grades K-12 compete by grade-level in one of three categories: General Education, Special Education or English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL).
- Scale of Points: Title 10%, Content 40%, Creativity Style 20%. Total 100%



Germantown Garden Club Celebrates National Garden Week

Members of Germantown Garden Cub began preparations for celebrating National Garden Week 2025 in March this year by working with students at Madonna Learning Center. These students have Downs Syndrome and various other neurological disorders. The school director, Jo Gilbert, wanted a student garden and outdoor classroom so that her students could practice their fine motor skills and learn healthier eating habits by growing vegetables. Germantown Garden Club partnered with the school and was awarded a Plant America grant in 2019 along with an Espoma Award to help the school establish the Student Vegetable Garden, a Herb Sensory Garden and outdoor classroom. A few years later the Pollinator garden was planted by Germantown Garden Club next to the Student Vegetable Garden. The pollinator garden has been designated a Monarch Way Station. Additionally a club bird trail of 4 houses was established by the club on the school grounds in 2019 and a very active house is in the middle of the pollinator garden. A multitude of stimulus sources await the students of Madonna Learning Center to help in their yearly lessons.

On March 18,2025 club members brought seeds, potting soil, markers, and planting cups to the school and helped each class of students plant seeds. The containers were marked and teachers carried the planting cups to their classrooms to grow the seeds under grow lights. Members then cleaned the outside beds in preparation for planting and the irrigation lines were checked. The pumpkin patch area was cleared for June planting and the perennial zinnia bed was weeded for a big summer showing.

Planting day in the garden arrived on May 15,2025. GGC members helped direct the students planting their classroom raised plants. Additional plants were provided by members to supplement the beds as some plants died in the classroom.

As the school year was coming to an end on May 23, National Garden week was celebrated early on May 15th by planting with the students and then again on June 6th during National Garden Week. On June 6th, all GGC members were asked to bring a plant to add to the various Madonna garden beds. Lemonade and cookies were provided for the club tour and and club members planted donated plants. A club member's husband built and brightly painted 3 climbing towers and placed them in the beds for zucchini squash and cucumber plants. Another member purchased a Peace Pole with the words "Live, Love, Garden" and presented the pole for placement in the garden to Assistant Director, Theresa Murray. Plant material in each bed was labeled with plant markers by club members.

Poplar Estates Garden Club

Poplar Estates Garden Club Milestone



Poplar Estates Garden Club (PEGC) members celebrate a 10-year milestone as they reflect back to 2016 when the club members took on a new project setting up its first bluebird trail at Bobby Lanier Farm Park, a Germantown city park in the middle of the town. With permission from the Germantown Parks and Recreation Department, members of the club rolled up their sleeves and with their tape measures and Stokes Bluebird Book in hand decided on the placement of five bluebird boxes purchased from Fred Robertson, a founder of the Shelby County Chapter of the Tennessee Bluebird Society. Each box was placed approximately 300 feet apart facing east or north and at eye level. The Farm Park is an ideal location for a bluebird trail with its wide-open spaces and easy accessibility.

Fast forward to 2019, Christopher Schmidt, one of the club's newest members, had a bluebird trail established in 2018 at Poplar Estates Park, another of Germantown's city parks. This was Christopher's first attempt at blue birding with NO FLEDGLINGS due to predator issues and competition from other birds occupying his boxes. 2019 proved to be a bright spot for PEGC with Christopher coming on board with his bluebird trail and joining the garden club. In the three years the Farm Park was monitored prior to 2019, the greatest number of babies fledging was 15. The Farm Park in 2019 had 23 babies fledging along with Christopher's trail producing 17 bluebirds fledging. It was a bluebird season to celebrate!

In 2020, PEGC established another bluebird trail at Forest Hill Elementary School FHES) with permission and blessings from the school principal. Again, Fred Robertson's boxes were installed and monitored. In 2024 and 2023, two of the four boxes were active with 18 eggs laid, 18 hatched and 18 babies fledged in 2024 while in 2023 there were 25 eggs laid with 23 eggs hatching and 23 babies fledging while only 14 babies fledged from the school trail in 2022.

On October 12, 2024 four members of the Shelby County Chapter of the Tennessee Bluebird Society with one of PEGC's members on hand moved two inactive boxes to a swale behind the school with permission from the school principal. One of the boxes was also replaced by the chapter at no cost to the garden club. The 2025 numbers for the bluebird activity at the school rewarded relocating the two inactive boxes with all four boxes active with 29 eggs laid, 24 eggs hatched and 24 eggs fledged. This was one of the best years for bluebird activity at FHES. The future of the school bluebird trail was in question for 2025 with its club member, Shirley McKenzie, not able to continue monitoring the trail due to health issues. Shirley recruited a fellow member, John Vaden, of the Shelby County Bluebird Chapter to step in to monitor the club's trail even though he is not a member of the Poplar Estates Garden Club. Both Shirley and John have

done an amazing job weekly monitoring the school trail without missing a beat! This story is testament to the dedication of bluebird lovers and monitors. They are a breed on to their own!

In addition to the three bluebird trails Poplar Estates Garden Club monitors, at least six of its members monitor bluebird boxes placed in their own yards with weekly monitoring of activity. Pictures of bluebird activity at all locations is captured on members' phones and shared with all members along with data recorded. What started out 10 years ago with one bluebird trail, has evolved into a major bluebird project providing much satisfaction knowing the club's efforts have been rewarded with an increase in the bluebird population in Germantown and surrounding area with a dividend of numerous awards received at the TFGC state level, Deep South and National level. However, PEGC's mission remains constant with their goal of helping to increase the bluebird population which is on the rise due to a massive conservation effort.

Poplar Estates Garden Club encourages others to join the bluebird conservation effort because regardless of your age you will not regret the benefits of joining the bluebird conservation movement! Ther are disappointments at times with unhatched eggs, nests abandoned, predator activity and even vandalism of nests but the bluebird journey is magical and is truly an amazing education for every age. It is an experience to be embraced and cherished!



Flower Show School Course 2



Flower Show School is a comprehensive program that teaches you all you need to know about judging, entering, competing and chairing an NGC Flower Show. There are four courses, each scheduled over a 2-3 day period, and each with a specific curriculum that includes horticulture, design, and flower show procedure (FSP). If you are considering becoming a flower show judge, planning to chair a flower show, or simply want to learn more, your first step is to attend Flower Show School. Subjects are taught by qualified instructors and outlines will be provided. Examples of horticulture and design are displayed and critiqued. Learn point scoring to evaluate how entries are judged and see what it takes to earn a blue ribbon.

Course 2:

Design studies functional table design, exhibition tables and petite designs. FSP covers types of flower shows, awards, and what it takes to produce a flower show. Horticulture covers labeling, growing, selecting, grooming, exhibiting and judging your plants. We will study evergreens, (needled and broad leaf) and daffodils.

Bring:

NGC Flower Show Handbook 2017 edition with 2024 revision—download free or print from the NGC website.

Print the outlines that will be emailed to you three weeks before the course and after you have paid, and bring the outlines with you to the course.

Jacket (A-C can get cold), reusable cup for coffee, water, etc., 8.5×11 " clipboard for taking the point scoring tests, pencils if taking the tests.

Students are encouraged to read: <u>Horticulture Exhibiting and Judging</u> and <u>Designing by Types</u>. Both books are available for purchase on the NGC website for \$5 each.







The **Garden Club of Signal Mountain** takes two months off each summer, but that does not mean the members stop serving the community. Our club's theme for this year is <u>Rooted and Grounded in Community</u>

<u>Beautification and Education</u> and that is exactly what GCSM members provide during the summer months.

Seven Landmarks on Signal Mountain are designed, planted and maintained each spring/summer/fall in the town city limits. This ongoing landscape tradition is made possible through the leadership of each landscape project's chairperson and the members that volunteer for each site's plant maintenance, fertilization and watering throughout the season.

Once plants have been selected, the chairman and her volunteers have a hands-on day to augment the soil and plant the planters. Individual club members sign up to be in charge of the site for one week during the season to water, fertilize and weed. This volunteer rotating schedule enables each site to have constant individual care. Some of the larger in-ground landscape projects have monthly workdays whereby the chairperson notifies the volunteers of a specific morning to weed, divide and transplant perennials and annuals to get ready for the upcoming season. Between the planters and the in ground landscapes, GCSM members keep our lovely community bright with welcoming flowers.

From the Welcome Signs, the Library, the Post Office, James Park, Blue Star Memorial and the Mountain Arts Community Center, the Garden Club of Signal Mountain strives to enhance our town and provide inspiration for our neighbors.

Mountain Laurel Garden Club members Bobbie Flowers, Angie Caldwell, Carol Morton and Sandy Vandenberg took part in the North American Butterfly Association (NABA) Butterfly Count in Cades Cove on July 8th. Our team of 4 counted 15 different species and a total of 149 butterflies.



The counts have been going on in the United States, Canada and Mexico since 1993 and in the Great Smoky Mountains for the last 4 years. In March 2025, the massive NABA dataset provided the primary source of butterfly count data for the study published in Science, shows butterflies have been in decline by a staggering 22% in the last 20 years. We must work to reverse this trend and create a world where butterflies thrive for the benefit of nature and people.



Blue Birds are native to East Tennessee and are cavity nesters that can create nests 3 times a year. Members learned how to attract bluebirds to their yards by providing shelter, food and water. Bluebirds are year round residents in East Tennessee and eat mainly bugs and caterpillars. During winter months, it is recommended to provide mealworms, nesting boxes and heated birdbaths. Once you attract Bluebirds, you should continue to have them as the lifespan is 8-9 years and birds return to same nest site yearly.






Molly Hampton District I

MARY RUDEN Wildflower Artist

District IV

"Wildflowers are equivalent to happiness to me," said Mary Ruden. "Their diversity, colors, and unwillingness to quit is invigorating. The act of growing them from seed is rewarding; most of them have to be started each year this way, after a harsh winter where they will go dormant and disappear."

Mary Ruden is a passionate artist and sculptor who loves sharing the beauty of wildflowers with others. A member of the Sevierville Garden Club, Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs, Tennessee Artist Association, Knoxville Arts & Culture Alliance, and the American Society of Botanical Artists, she has dedicated her life to celebrating nature through her distinctive artistic interpretation. With degrees in art and medical science, she brings a unique perspective to her work, blending scientific knowledge with creative expression.

Residing in the Seymour and Sevierville area, Mary appreciates the strong sense of community and the region's accessibility to natural beauty. Her involvement in organizations such as the Sevierville chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) includes participation in annual fundraising events like the Tea, which the public can attend by purchasing tickets, typically available in late April or May.


Mary's love for wildflowers extends beyond appreciation—she actively cultivates and documents them. She describes wildflowers as symbols of happiness, closely intertwined with butterflies, birds, and pollinators of all kinds. Their vibrant colors and resilience inspire her, particularly in how they must be regrown from seed each year after harsh winters. She finds horticultural therapy immensely rewarding, both in wildflower cultivation and vegetable gardening.

Her journey into the world of botanical art began early. "I had a rose garden when I was five years old," she said, "and have drawn, painted, and sculpted flowers for decades." Maintaining a flower garden as a child was an experience that laid the foundation for a lifelong fascination with flora. Over the decades, she has painted, drawn, and



sculpted flowers, further fueling her passion during travels to the tropics, where she developed an interest in orchids and tropical plants. She was astounded by the diversity of plant species in Tennessee, where numerous parks and trails provide endless opportunities for nature observation. To share the beauty and diversity of native orchids, she created two posters showcasing their various species.

As an advocate for education, Ruden has contributed significantly to



Among all wildflowers, Ruden holds a special admiration for the lady slipper orchid. Several species of lady slippers can be found in Tennessee, though they are rarely seen. These orchids thrive in wooded areas and high-elevation regions, where colder temperatures and remote locations make them even more elusive. The showy lady slipper, distinguished by its magenta and white petals, is particularly striking. Inspired by their beauty, she sculpted a pink lady slipper orchid in bronze, which has been displayed at prestigious venues such as the Tennessee State Museum, the Knoxville and Nashville airports, Arrowmont School of Arts & Crafts, and various art galleries. Other wildflowers she finds captivating include fire pinks—scarlet, three-foot-tall plants that attract numerous pollinators, including hummingbirds. Their resilience and visual appeal make them excellent additions to any sunny garden.

Beyond botanical art, Ruden has contributed to public art through large-scale sculptures. Before transitioning to a full-time artist and









sculptor, she taught art at the college level for eight years. Her notable works include sculptures that commemorate historic figures and local legends. One of her most recognized pieces is the bronze statue of "Bertie the Bird Dog," situated across from the Sevierville courthouse. This piece honors Dr. Massey's dog, who famously carried his owner's earnings in a money pouch to the local bank in the early 1900s. When the statue was unveiled, members of Dr. Massey's family attended the dedication ceremony, sharing stories of Bertie's remarkable routine.

Ruden has also sculpted bronze busts of influential women in Tennessee history, including Anne Davis, known as the "Mother" of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Davis, a Tennessee legislator in 1925, played a pivotal role in the park's establishment, authoring the necessary legislation to ensure its creation. Ruden's bust of Davis has been displayed at the Sevierville Convention Center for the Rose Glen Literary Festival and at the East Tennessee History Center in Knoxville for the 100th Anniversary of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

Her commitment to the study and preservation of plants led her to join the Sevierville Garden Club over a decade ago. With 37 years of active community involvement, the club promotes gardening knowledge and beautification efforts. Monthly meetings feature expert speakers on topics such as pollinators, native plants, and floral arranging. Ruden has shared her expertise with the club, delivering talks on native orchids and wildflowers.

Ruden's artistic and environmental contributions extend beyond Sevier County. Her public art installations include two large outdoor sculptures in Founders Park in Johnson City, TN, and others at the American Museum of Science & Energy in Oak Ridge, TN, as well as in North Carolina. She has been honored with a Preservation Award from the Knox Heritage East Tennessee Preservation Alliance for her dedication to historical and environmental conservation.

Mary's Scottish heritage also plays a significant role in her artistic endeavors. As a member of the Hannay Clan, she has been actively involved in the Scots-Irish Festival held in historic downtown Dandridge. This festival celebrates Scots-Irish traditions with bagpipe performances, highland cattle displays, Irish step dancing, and historical society booths. Visitors can explore clan booths that provide ancestral history, tartan patterns, and coats of arms. Ruden, as an artist, even designed a coat of arms for her clan, incorporating the periwinkle flower, which historically served as an identifier when the English prohibited the wearing of kilts. Her clan's charitable organization, clanhannay.org, is dedicated to restoring Sorbie Tower, their ancestral home in Scotland, providing historical resources for those unable to travel there.

Mary Ruden's life and work are a testament to her deep appreciation for nature, history, and artistic expression. Whether through her sculptures, botanical illustrations, or advocacy for wildflower conservation, she continues to inspire others to appreciate and protect the natural beauty that surrounds them. Her contributions not only celebrate the vibrant flora of Tennessee but also leave a lasting impact on public art and historical preservation. Through her passion, she bridges the gap between art and nature, ensuring that the beauty of wildflowers and the stories of the past remain vivid for generations to come.







Spring Brings Wildflowers

The Great Smoky Mountains National Park is visited by more than thirteen million people each year and is the most biologically diverse national park in the United States. The annual Spring Wildflower Pilgrimage takes place in late April and involves experts leading tours, and activities to see native plants in their spring splendor. Sugarlands Visitor Center in Gatlinburg has details on self-guiding nature trails which are a mile or less.

There are more than 1,600 flowering plants, including 100 native tree species in the GSMNP. Warning: you may fall in love with wildflowers or other native plants of the Smokies. About fifty species of ferns are found near moist areas such as river banks or old rotting logs, and a large number of medicinal plants exist. All plants in the Smokies are

> protected in the rich environment there; these native plants make up the precious charac-

ter of the Park. I authored and illustrated



and range in color from white, pink, yellow to burgundy. Many small wildflowers cover the ground to make a spectacular carpet of color, such as purple phacelia, thyme-leaved bluets, and blue phlox. The first famous botanist of the Smokies, William Bartram (1734-1823), identified 3,710 varieties of plant life there and created illustrations of the plants.

Rhododendrons are abundant in the lower elevations in June and at mid and high elevations at the end of June. The pinkish -purple blossoms of the Catawba rhododendron are spectacular. Rosebay rhododendrons are more common to the Smokies, and have white flowers. The spectacular flame azaleas bloom in May and June at low to mid elevations, including Gregory Bald, above Cades Cove, and Andrews Bald near Kuwohi (formerly Clingmans Dome). Mountain laurel has pink and white flowers blooming from May to June and can be seen many places, including the Roaring Fork Motor Trail.

The GSMNP has about 36 species of orchids. The largest ones are the lady slippers, and there is a pink one and a yellow one, often seen as a clump of flowers in a setting of wide, waxy green leaves. The orchid that stands even taller is the fringed orchid. It is seen in a golden yellow color and a lavender purple color. They are more of a summer bloomer and can be up to three feet high.



Identification of native orchids is aided by referring to goorchids.northamericanorchidcenter.org. This is a useful website for identification, with many photos and maps of geographical areas where the orchid is native to, it's pollinator, and conservation status. The website is served by the NorthAmerican Orchid Conservation Center, a part of the Smithsonian Institution.

Several varieties of native orchids have endangered status and some have threatened status due to declining numbers in the wild. Orchids have a symbiotic relationship with fungi called mycorrhizae that lives in the forest, and the orchids will not survive without this. Many displays of flowers are removed by visitors with a desire to try to grow them at home. This is not legal, and we must enjoy them in the original setting and take only photos. Several photography groups conduct wildflower and waterfall hikes, and this is a great way to remember these spring beauties.

Preservation of the environment where our native orchids live is important to their survival, and that of many other plants, insects, and all life forms. Through my art I try to inspire, entertain, and demonstrate these rare species and their relationship within our world.







Faith Young, **Recording Secretary** reported that minutes for the post convention Executive Board meeting on April 24, 2025 were approved by the readers.

Vicky Richards, **Corresponding Secretary** reported sending cards to Tove Rollins was sent a card in sympathy of losing her son. Lelia Johnson announced that Pat Best, a past district director, passed away in Florida. Dr. Jan Brown asked for a card to be sent to Cathy Donaldson as she is recovering from an injury.

Marilyn Smith, **Treasurer** said the main TFGC account has a balance of \$17,052.15. She is getting dues, but has some outstanding. She was just granted access to the accounts so she will have updates later. (Attachment # 1)

Evelyn Davis, **Assistant Treasurer** said she is responsible for general investment funds and accounts are stagnant. The restricted funds are all money markets and they are having difficulty in accessing accounts but some (4) were transferred to brokerage accounts. The ETF (Endowment Trust Fund) has new deposit slips, and the account must be transferred to a brokerage account to prevent fees, but this process has been very slow and laborious. Currently they have a grand total of invested funds with a balance today of \$98,347.74. Life Memberships have \$24,277.04, TFGC Scholarship Fund has \$11,304.02 with \$4,500 going out each year directly to the colleges, the Brainerd Scholarship has \$29,642.46 which pays a \$3,000 scholarship each year. The General Investment Fund had \$17,000.00 in the President's Fund, \$602.00 in the Benevolent Fund, and \$15,522.22 in Undesignated funds with a total balance of \$33,124.22. (Attachment # 2)

Lelia said we need reports for all funds shared to members of the executive board in a transparent manner. The reports need to be legally dispersed.

District Director Reports:

Lelia stated that the District Director or the Vice District Director is to send a report for TFGC Board Meetings to the TFGC Recording Secretary and President.

District I- represented by Chris Kelyman, Poplar Estates Garden Club who said hello to all.

District 2-Becky Fox Matthews-Gateway Acres Garden Cub-they are busy and will report at the next meeting.

District 3- Jackie Westfield-Aldersgate Garden Club thanked the state Convention Chairs from District 3 and said that even though District 3 is the smallest district in the state, it is united with the theme "It's Growing Time in District 3". All of the 10 clubs have been busy but 7 clubs provided reports on their activities and actions during National Garden Week. SEE report (Attachment # 3)

District 4- Dr. Janet Brown-Chapman Highway Garden Club said their district of 22 clubs has been busy with club officers installations and filling all district 4 positions. Jan attended the TFGC convention and the NGC Convention in Charleston, South Carolina. She is also working with TFGC for the restructuring of Ivan Racheff House and Gardens Committee as well as chairing the Children's Garden at Racheff. SEE Report

Committee Chair Reports:

Debbie Shaver-Awards Chair-said that TFGC had 80 books of evidence submitted, 18 yearbooks, 8 flower shows, 5 schedules and 6 staging entered for awards 2024. She congratulated all involved and reminded that flower show scheduling and staging are separate awards. (The staging form is filled out at flower shows by the evaluating panel, which sends it to the state awards chair.) Debbie sent 19 books of evidence, 3 press books, 1 small standard flower show, 2 schedules, 6 yearbooks, and 4 Deep South Unified Projects. TFGC had one overall winner, 8 first place, 10 second place, 1 third place, 3 fourth place, and 4 unified winners. She sent to NGC: 28 books of evidence and 5 flower shows. National awards three types of awards and several clubs received Appreciation Awards for participating, 6 clubs were first place winners, all 5 flower shows won national awards,- youth poetry contest had a 3rd place and a National scholarship award went to Sophia Chaplin. She encouraged all to send in books of evidence for National Garden week activities.

Debbie Shaver-<u>State Calendars Chair-</u>a form is online, but use any form as the deadline is coming up August 1st. Discussion: Clubs are not buying the calendars which are a national production, so some clubs donate \$3 per member to the State Scholarship funds rather than buying calendars. (TFGC keeps the money over calendar costs, but costs have gone up.) Some buy them and use them as door prizes, others use them for Christmas gifts.

<u>Cumberland Trail Chair</u>-Debbie Shaver is also a member of The Friends of the Cumberland Trail who recently had a meeting and are looking at a fall event and monthly series topics and programs up and down the trail. The trail is @ 95% completed and they are seeking property and then anticipate connection of the trail from Rock Creek to Crossville. Friends of the Trail purchased new trail maps and worked with the Cumberland Trail Conference that does trail building. Debbie is current chair of the Friends of the Trail and needs members, dues are \$15.

<u>Conservation Camp Co Chair</u>-Debbie Shaver said she and Anne Leonard are co-chairs for this event, but it's 15 months out so they will send information as details are determined. It will be in October 2026.

Anne Leonard, <u>Co-Chair of the Tennessee State Convention</u>, said they had 148 registered attendees. She reported the remaining balance from the convention is \$2,125.04, even though the convention is not a money making event. Anne also stated that the Audio Visual costs for the convention were over \$4000

but the \$2300 raised by sales for the Convention Booklet Ads helped to partially cover this amount. Maggie Burns, Diane Ryder and Anne will be working to update the state Convention Manual.

Directors the updated ETF Application and the Information to apply sheet. The deadline for the application is Sept 1st and All ETF Trustees review the grant applications. The current trustees for 2025- 2027 are: Lelia Johnson, LaQuita Misner, Marilyn Smith, Evelyn Davis (District 3), Chris Kelyman (District 1), Becky Fox Mathews (District 2), and Dr Jan Brown (District 4). Officers for 2025-2027 were elected May 19. 2025 with Chris Kelyman Trustee Chair, Evelyn Davis ETF Treasurer, and Dr. Janet Brown as ETF recording Secretary. The May 31, 2025 current balance for the ETF three Vanguard Fund is \$194,711.27. Discussion: Maggi Burns said since the ETF is growing with interest but the State Scholarship fund is low, what about focusing on funds for the Scholarship. Evelyn Davis said the ETF fund, even though it has grown, is not keeping up with inflation. (Attachment # 5)

Chris Kelyman reported on the Endowment Trust Funds (ETF). She stated that she emailed all the District

President Johnson said she will be meeting this week to develop a budget for TFGC.

Marilyn McDonnell reported as the <u>Gardening School Chair and Native Plants Chair</u>. She has been active with garden clubs in Georgia as well as TN, so as the new Gardens School Chair she will need help getting speakers on specific topics. She is planning a Gardening School of 4 courses in January 2026 and said the classes are not challenging so she encouraged attendance.

Jeri Melton with the <u>Trillium Council</u> (reporting for Virginia Pennington) said the Council is made up of active TFGC members who are graduates of the Environmental School, Gardening School and Landscape Design School. She also announced an upcoming refresher (multi level) course from National Garden Club, for continued accreditation that will be done at conservation camp. She also stated that Diane Ryder would be taking over the responsibilities for continuing the existence of the Trillium Council.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Lelia Johnson said rather than selling goods as fund raisers for the <u>Ways & Mean</u>s, she proposed to request financial donations from all TFGC members. She said \$10 was acceptable as money is needed

to operate the federation. If some can't pay \$10, all should pay some.

Phyllis Allen made a **MOTION** to take donations "No work, no purchase" for WAYS AND MEANS of \$10 per member each year, collected through the TFGC treasurer via local club treasures. The **MOTION** was seconded by Evelyn Davis. The motion carried with all voting in favor.

More Discussion: Lelia would like it to be the same as paying dues and be due October 1st. If all don't participate, she would be willing to look at making some payment. Discussion: can it be reduced as the check would be sent by the club's treasures, Kathy Rychen said if some can't pay, a gift could be made for those members. Kathy Kulak suggested selling Ads in the Volunteer Gardener to help cover the members not paying. Where would this money be going? Could the funds that went to pay for the Volunteer Gardener help cover costs? Funds are needed for Ways and Means which is a specific account that covers expenses for the president to attend TFGC, Deep South, and NGC meetings and the state president as a representative of TFGC from the Ways and Means. Mileage is not covered in these allotted expenses per the current bylaws and this needs to be reviewed and rules revised. Costs for the presidential activities have been from \$6,000 up to \$10,000.

Diane Ryder **amended** the Phyllis Allen **MOTION to** *Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs would do a* "No Work, No Purchase" ways and means fundraiser for 2025-2027 with each club being asked to contribute \$10 per member by October 1, 2025 with a club check. The amended motion was seconded by LaQuita Misner. The motion carried with all voting in favor.

Diane Ryder reported on Pro <u>ZOOM</u> access at @ \$160 a year for up to 99 users, 30 hours per meeting with an AI companion and at least 5 Gigabytes of storage. This would allow districts to hold meetings by ZOOM. TFGC1926@epbfi.com or gmail could be used for the label and in the password. Diane made a **MOTION** that we accept this Zoom opportunity with a second by Becky Fox Matthews. The motion passed.

NEW BUSINESS:

Lelia talked about the TFGC Website and said she would like it to be something that belonged to TFGC. Janeene Larkin-Horn along with Shannon Thurman then presented the TFGC website heading into the future. Janeene had been involved with the website in the past under a previous president and she said it takes a lot of time so the site needs to be available to smoothly trade off to new administrations in the ongoing future. The website she has developed is based on a professional non profit site design. The software was donated and is Wordpress with Elementor and Dreamhost for data hosting. Both were given to the TFGC organization for ongoing usage. The administrators can update, delete, add new things, etc. (Shannon has a background in publishing also.) They have capabilities for displaying the

Volunteer Gardener and clubs can use it for their newsletters. Documents will be stored as PDF's. They will go back to the URL tngardenclubs.org and the home page will be open for view to non members. Photos can be added as desired. The Leadership of the board has password protection of this (TNGarden2025) specific to members of the board, with private information not viewable by the public. Pictures are available with board members' information. Forms are now updated and usable online but let them know if you see any errors. The board of directors have been assigned aliases under position titles for use with email. The website has a NEWS site that can be accessed through "resources", news events and can be submitted online. The color codes for the districts are: Yellow-1, green2-blue,3 and orange 4. This site is again available for use now. (Attachment # 6)

Bylaws updates will be added after they have been formally approved. (Minutes from the state business meeting will be added when the transcription is received.)

MOTIONS:

*Debbie Shaver moved that Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs sponsor Deep South Award Number #6-Birds, in honor of Denise Thorne in the amount of \$100. This would be a yearly sponsorship. It was 2nded by Jan Brown. Discussions: Anne Leonard amended the motion to change it from yearly to a 2 year time frame.

MOTION Tennessee sponsors Deep South Award Number #6-Birds, in honor of Denise Thorne in the amount of \$100. This would be \$100 each year for 2 years. Motion carried. (Attachment #7)

*Maggi Burns, Crestwood Garden Club, D 3, Former State President, former Bylaws/Standing Rules made a **bylaws change proposal/motion** for Article XIII Ivan Racheff House and Gardens.

ARTICLE XIII. IVAN RACHEFF HOUSE AND GARDENS

Section 1. The name of the committee to administer the affairs of Ivan Racheff House and Gardens (hereafter referred to as IRH&G), TFGC Headquarters and property, shall be the IRH&G Board of Governors. The IRH&G Board of Governors shall consist of a minimum of thirty-six (36) members from the membership of TFGC. Included in this number are the current President of TFGC, President-elect of TFGC, Treasurer of TFGC, District Director of each District of TFGC, IRH&G Chairman of each District of TFGC, and the President of

District IV Council of Garden Clubs. The IRH&G Board of Governors shall elect the balance

of the active membership from District IV.

The IRH&G Plan of Operation, adopted November 8, 1977, updated and revised with each administration, shall serve as the official guideline and becomes effective when approved by the TFGC Executive Committee. The latest revision shall be attached to the official Bylaws held by the Recording Secretary of TFGC during each administration. The TFGC President shall serve on the IRH&G Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Ivan Racheff House and Gardens Treasurer shall perform the duties designated by the TFGC President, Job Descriptions, Treasurers' Manual for TFGC, and designated by the Plan of Operation for IRH&G.

Section 3. The Ivan Racheff House and Gardens Assistant Treasurer shall assist the IRH&G Treasurer as delegated by the TFGC President, Job Description, Treasurers' Manual and the IRH&G Plan of Operation.

CHANGED TO READ:

ARTICLE XIII. IVAN RACHEFF HOUSE AND GARDENS

Section 1. The name of the committee to administer the affairs of Ivan Racheff House and Gardens (hereafter referred to as IRH&G), TFGC Headquarters and property, shall be The IRH&G Committee. The IRH&G Committee shall consist of a minimum of thirty-six (36) members from the membership of TFGC. Included in this number are the current President of TFGC, President-elect of TFGC, Treasurer of TFGC, the Advisory Committee, District Director of each District of TFGC, IRH&G Chairmen of each District of TFGC, and the President of District IV Council of Garden Clubs. The Racheff Committee is open to all TFGC members

The IRH&G Manual, (formerly named the Plan of Operations) adopted November 8, 1977,

updated and revised with each administration, shall serve as the official guideline and becomes effective when approved by the TFGC Executive Committee. The latest revision shall be attached to the official Bylaws held by the Recording Secretary of TFGC during each Administration. The TFGC President shall serve on the IRH&G Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Ivan Racheff House and Gardens Treasurer shall perform the duties designated by the TFGC President, Duties of Officers & Racheff Treasurers document, Treasurers' Manual for TFGC, and designated by IRH&G Manual.

Section 3. The Ivan Racheff House and Gardens Assistant Treasurer shall assist the IRH&G Treasurer as delegated by the TFGC President, Duties of Officers & Racheff Treasurers, Treasurers' Manual and the IRH&G Manual.

REASONS FOR CHANGES: Board of Governors: Former presidents were advised by a lawyer that an organization has one board and that is the TFGC Board. Racheff is a committee under the TFGC Board.

The Advisory Committee: Added to the Racheff Committee as the Advisory Committee consists of former TFGC Presidents and we are not guests to the Racheff Committee.

Plan of Operation Manual: Change to Racheff Manual to conform with the other TFGC manuals:

The Awards Manual, Events Manual and the Treasurers Manual.

Job Descriptions: Correct title is Duties of Officers & Duties & Racheff Treasurers.

Section 1: Last sentence deleted and replaced with The Racheff Committee is open to all TFGC members.

There were 36 on the committee as reported by Maggi Burns. <u>MOTION carried</u> without a 2nd as the proposal came from committee. (Attachment #8)

*Valerie Tipps, Lookout Mountain Beautiful Garden Club, Past TFGC President. **MOTION** *I move that the office of TFGC Assistant Treasurer be a permanent position on the Endowment Trust Fund* 162

Committee. Presently the TFGC President, President-Elect, Treasurer and one representative from each District serve. In order to maintain the current makeup of seven members and maintain a distribution, the TFGC Assistant Treasurer will replace the District Representative in the District that provides the President for two years. As the offices of TFGC change every two years, persons serving those positions will change. Motion carried-2nd by Evelyn in committee. (Attachment # 9)

*Valerie Tipps, Lookout Mountain Beautiful Garden Club, Past TFGC President. **MOTION** *I move that the TFGC Board of Directors as suggested by the TFGC immediate former Treasurer and Acting Racheff Treasure, Karen Dawson and Interim Committee of Racheff House and Gardens, review, think about and be consulted on the opinion about the preferred thing to do with the Coco Cola stock owned by TFGC for the benefit of Racheff House and Gardens.* **No action was taken.**

Discussion: Anne Leonard said to keep the Coke stock. This was to be deferred to the finance committee per comments. LaQuita Misner said to wait till other companies talk to the finance committee and add it to the whole picture before taking any action. (Attachment # 10)

*Chris Kelyman, Poplar Estate Garden Club, District 1, on behalf of the Trustees made a **MOTION.** *TFGC Standing Rules Section X #4 and Section IX #7 be revised to read "donations to the ETF are sent to the ETF Treasurer.* Currently the section reads donations to the ETF are sent to the ETF chairman. (Rationale, this change is recommended in the interest of efficiency so checks are handled once in the post office with less chance of loss or delay in the delivery and are sent directly to the ETF treasurer who makes the deposits. The Motion carried.
