

# Message From Your District II Director Becky Fox Matthews

### Reasons to Leave the Leaves

October is National Leave the Leaves Month, according to the National Wildlife Federation. Margaret Roach recently reported in the New York Times that leaving fallen leaves helps pollinators thrive. In Maryland, a two-year study investigated what happens when people remove leaves in the fall versus leaving them. The results showed that nearly 2,000 insects emerge from just one square meter of yard where leaves are left—excluding decomposers like earthworms and millipedes. Areas where leaves were cleared saw moth numbers drop by 45 percent, spiders by 56 percent, beetles by 24 percent, and overall butterfly and moth species diversity was cut by 44 percent.

Many creatures including birds, box turtles, salamanders, toads, frogs, fireflies, bees, butterflies, and moths depend on leaf litter for shelter. In fact, 94 percent of moth species need a layer of leaves to complete their life cycle, and numerous backyard bird species rely on caterpillars from these moths to feed their young each spring.

Even shredding leaves can harm overwintering insects or alter their microhabitat so they can't survive. If you must remove your leaves, it's better to rake and move whole leaves rather than shred them—and to relocate them to areas not already covered in leaves to create new habitats and shrink your lawn. When possible, leave the leaves and help wildlife thrive right in your own garden.

# Native Wildflowers Bingo!

Margaret Mainardi welcomed us to her beautiful farm in Readyville, TN, on September 16. We met on her patio, where we enjoyed a delicious lunch, with dozens of hummingbirds just outside partaking of the clear nectar she provides them.

Our gardens have recovered somewhat since the worst of the August heat, and we had many horticulture specimens as well as "Fall Harvest", "Schooltime", and "Better Late" designs. Guest Judges Linda Peterson and Star Eaker of Garden Lovers judged the entries, with Mary Forrest Hancock clerking, while Margaret gave her highly informative presentation on "Using Native Plants in the Home Landscaping Plan". We learned about keystone plants like the oak tree that hosts 500 species of caterpillars that in turn provide sustenance to birds (for energy), while fall berries from native plants are a great source of energy for migratory and overwintering birds.

To make her lessons truly memorable, Margaret organized four games of "Bingo", with the challenge being to spot, for example, the keystone plants listed on our sheets. We even had prizes, including books about birds and plants.

During the business portion of our meeting, Patty Compton reported on the Seed Grant from TFGC District II and our application for a continuation of the grant for next year so that we can carry on our work of distributing native wildflower and heirloom vegetable seeds to educational and community support projects in Murfreesboro. We were also reminded to attend the District II meeting in Joelton on October 7.

It was a delightful meeting in a perfect setting, and we left having gained important knowledge as well as seeing our Flower Growers friends.

# Flower Lovers Circle






# Leipers Fork Garden Club

### Key dates:

- 1891 Garden clubs started in Athens GA with the first local branch. Its stated mission is "to promote the love of gardening, floral design, and civic and environmental responsibility."
- 1929 The National Garden Clubs organization was formed consisting of branches in nineteen states.
- 1921 The organization consists of dozens of local branches, in nearly every state in the U.S. and has about 190,000 members.
- 1944 Blue Star Memorial highway program began, honoring Americans military service.
- 1992 Surge in membership of garden clubs.



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### GARDENING—A WAY OF LIFE

#### A Walk with Nature

"Reading about nature is fine, but if a person walks in the woods and listens carefully, he can learn more than what is in books, for the woods speak with a spiritual voice." (George Washington Carver)

It is not so much for its beauty that the forest makes a claim upon our hearts, as for the subtle something, that quality of air that emanates from old trees, that so wonderfully changes and renews a weary spirit. (Robert Louis Stevenson)

Every April and May, cherry trees blossom throughout Japan, transforming many parts of the country into wonderlands. Because cherry blossoms bloom so quickly, are so beautiful, then die suddenly, the Japanese consider them a symbol of the transitory nature of life itself.

Scientist studying actions that promote good health continue to promote the benefits of walking and viewing nature. One of the easiest, most pleasurable, and sensual walks with nature is the Tremont Trail in the Smokey Mountain National Park. It is a trail designed for all skill levels. One will enjoy all types of wild fauna and floral as well as cascading streams and waterfalls. It is a calming delight not to be missed. To access the trails coming out of Pigeon Forge, take the Parkway South Wears Valley Road and turn right toward Cades Cove. You will drive until you shortly see the Tremont Trail sign at the Visitors' Center. Tremont Trail is truly an amazing sight.
