A message from Kathy Pearson on the Mustard Seed Camp at Ivan Racheff House and Gardens

The morning of July 29th was the beginning of our 2022 Mustard Seed Camp. Recent rains made the Racheff's garden area a muddy mess, as confirmed by Pam, the groundskeeper, who told me, "The children's garden flooded with all the rain we've had." Regardless, John Bradley and Suzanne Bowman from the Lakemoor Hills Club, along with Kathy Treffet from the Sunup Garden Club, trudged away with the children to plant multiple-colored irises, purple petunias, and magnificent orange zinnias. The Norwood Garden Club provided gloves to keep the thick mud from getting all over the children's clothes, as they pulled weeds and planted their iris in the beds chosen for planting.

After returning from the garden, the children were divided into three groups for more fun activities. Each group rotates after 30 minutes of instruction. Diane Forry from the Chapman Highway Garden Club instructed the kids about recycling using newspaper, as well as other items they can recycle. The children made recycled newspaper flowerpots and planted radishes with take home instructions from Diane on how to care for their new plant.

Joan Helton and Connie Barker from the Sunup Garden Club led the next group. Their presentation topics were visiting Reelfoot Lake in west Tennessee and making lotus blossoms. They showed a video of the cypress trees' knees which are the actual roots of the cypress tree and the lotus blossoms with pads that bloom in the lake and

Mountain Laurel G C had a delightful August meeting, with member Angie Caldwell instructing members on the technique of "flower pounding ". Members brought cotton tee shirts, aprons, fabric for wall hangings or anything they wanted to decorate. Everyone also brought flowers from their gardens to use and to share with others. Before the meeting, members soaked fabric in 4 quarts of hot water with 1 T cream of tartar and 1 T alum until cool. Fabric or item was then hung to dry and ironed.

Each member completed their project at the meeting. Designs were arranged and then cardboard was placed beneath the fabric, flower or leaf was placed on fabric with a piece of parchment paper covering it and then the pounding with a hammer began. After vigorous


pounding, the flower or leaf was removed and the next flower or leaf was placed on fabric and process was repeated. A few plants that seemed to work well were chives, Japanese maples, sensitive ferns, cosmos, vinca, Cleome, marigolds, and ironweed. Some members then outlined their designs with fabric pencils. After 24 hours, fabric needed to be ironed, then soaked in cold water with ½ cup salt, rinsed and hung to dry.

Maryville College has again asked the club to decorate for their October Homecoming Celebration, so members will be using their creativity again in September, constructing scarecrows.

More notes from Kathy Pearson and **Norwood Garden Club**

Chances are you remember the story about the "Sunflower Garden" at Powell Library. Well, guess what? We are back! Planting sunflowers takes a lot of patience, stamina, and flexibility. We planted mammoth, colorful, dwarf sunspot sunflowers and sunflower skyscrapers. We thought we were "one up" on the planting this year but a week later, I returned to find a mama bunny and three little bunnies scampering away from the garden area. Needless to say, all but one plant remained. So, once again, we planted and replanted! I also went to Powell Florist because they had planted sunflowers and I had another idea that I'll share with you later. When, finally, I decided the best thing to do was replant at home and keep them to give away to the children and allow them to experience the joys and troubles of gardening.

We were invited to return to story time at the library to share with them the plight of the sunflowers. We began with a few songs, followed by three stories about sunflowers. We had a total of sixteen children that I shared the same story with, as I just shared with you. I showed the children two sunflower heads which I got from the sunflower patch that Walta Pat, the owner of Powell Florist, grows.

Since we had no sunflower heads that were dried up, the children were able to pull out seeds from the head to take home. I also shared with the children, several types, and sizes of seeds from marigold, sunflowers, gladiola, and celosia. Norwood provided baggies to put all of their seeds in to take home for planting. We gave away four sunflower plants, three gladiola bulbs, celosia seeds ,and sunflower seeds.

I discussed with the children what plants need in order to grow and asked them these questions about planting: "What do you need to grow a plant?" They answered, "Soil, seeds, and water." I said, "Correct, but you need one more thing,--- it's something that keeps the soil warm." A little child answered, "I know--a blanket!" We laughed and I said, "Well, it is like a blanket. It is the sun that keeps the soil warm like a blank. Later, we made a craft: a sunflower picture made from foam and placed on a piece of construction paper. They were excited and wanted to be sure I saw their pictures.

We concluded our visit by inviting them to visit the back of the library to see the remaining sunflowers. What a great way to end two years of sharing with the community!


